Premadasa is said to have created his own downfall after a self-inflicted "Raja Pissuwa." Even Chandrika, a more liberal-minded President, tried to spin her way around to remain in office longer than required by the law. She engaged in hair-splitting about the date of swearing-in.

Wars such as the one we ended recently also seem to hearten dictatorial proclivities. The war gave the current President emergency powers on a huge scale. President Rajapakse claimed that Lasantha Wickrematunge had been his buddy but he did nothing to catch his killers although the murder occurred in broad daylight and in held-up traffic.

While media suppression is a well-

known path to dictatorial rule cult-building is yet another. In cult-building the leader is presented to the people as someone without blemish and a unique messiah. " Maha Rajaneni," cardboard cut-outs, the honours given by each sect of the Sangha all play their role in cult-building.

Even our universities which represent the highest realm of the academe have joined the bandwagon of honour awards. Colombo University's Vice Chancellor wants to show what a good boy he is by offering Honorary doctorates to the President and the Defence Minister. This is a total abuse of the device of honorary doctorates as such awards are meant to constitute the university's recognition of an individual for the learning he has displayed or for some non-political achievement, for example in the cultural field. A good example that comes to mind is Senerath Paranawithana. In the end, our President might shrink at the realization that Mervin Silva also has an Honorary doctorate

Those who want to set up monarchies, life-long Presidencies, or simple dictators (they all, in essence, mean the same thing) must take a cue from Lord Acton's famous aphorism: "Power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely." What Lord Acton has suggested here is that the true understanding of human nature alone would preclude the rational support for authoritarian rule whether of a monarch or a simple dictator. There are no perfect rulers and never will there be. Unless held accountable they tend to abuse their power.
